

Well it's almost Winter. We've already had over a half of a foot of snow; so, it's not too early to ask the question...Are you ready? Here's some things you might want to think about as winter approaches:

- Is your car ready for the winter weather?
- Is your house ready for winter?
- Are your winter transportation vehicles tuned up and serviced?

These are things we who live in Arrowhead need to take care of prior to the onslaught of winter weather. Tires need to be checked for not only the proper tread depth but also for the proper tread type. In case you're not aware there is a different rubber compound to winter tires versus summer tires and the tread pattern is different too. Good summer tires and some all weather tires are just not good enough for constant snow use as we see here on the mountain.



Good traction enhancing devices are also essential. If you don't have chains or cables for your vehicle now is the time to get them. There are several retailers in the area who sell them so take the time to buy them now. It beats having to get pulled out of the ditch by your fellow community members, Patrol or by Will and the loader. As of the time of this writing we've already had one individual who had to be pulled out who probably thought the mud tires on his four wheel drive truck were good enough. And that was with only 6" of snow. Oh, and don't forget to put a shovel and maybe some kitty litter in for good measure.

Take the time to have your battery checked to make sure it's in good enough condition to withstand cold starting. It takes a lot more power to crank a cold engine with a cold battery than a warm one. Keep a set of jumper cables handy too. Have your vehicle serviced including new filters and an oil change.

Be prepared for winter travel. Put extra food and water in your vehicle and also throw in a blanket or sleeping bag and a flashlight. You never can tell when you may have to spend some extended time on the side of the road or in case you go off the road and can't get out.





In regard to your getting your house ready you might want to think about having some freeze protection on your piping and your water meter. If we have a cold winter without much snow frozen meters are a real problem. Yes, it does happen. Take the steps now to insulate or heat trace to avoid having to do without water or worse yet broken pipes. Make sure you winter heat source is serviced. Have a snow shovel or two ready near the door so you don't have to go dig them out after it snows.

Now is the time to get those snowmobiles or UTV's serviced. Be sure they are ready to go as doing it now beats having to work on them in a blizzard when they won't start. Be sure to bring extra food and water on your snowmobile also. In the past we've had residents get stuck and not be able to make it home or to the parking lot and have to walk. Sure, it's only a couple of mile or so but it's still a pain and can be out and out treacherous, especially at night!!

These are just a few things you can do to make your life better, easier and safer here in the winter. We take these same steps for our equipment to better serve the community so please take the time to do your part so we don't have to come rescue you if you don't.





AIA Board of Directors **Election Update**

As of the deadline of August 14, 2020, only one (1) Letter of Intent to run for the two Board seats to be vacated in January 2021 was received. The sole candidate was current Vice President, Brad Fowler. Per AIA Bylaws Section 2.5 - D. Voting Procedures for Owners – regarding uncontested elections candidates may be affirmed to succeed by a majority vote of the Board.

At the September 19, 2020 Regular Board Meeting, the Board voted by simple majority to affirm Brad Fowler to succeed his seat.

The remaining seat to be vacated by Jim Matteson in January 2021 cannot be filled until the vacancy occurs per AIA Bylaws Section 3.5 – Vacancies on the Board of Directors - may be filled by an affirmative vote of the remaining Directors.

The Board plans to announce the vacancy in January, receive owner applications to serve and will vote to fill the seat from applicants at a Board Meeting in the Spring of 2021.



Fall colors have arrived and the summer of Covid 19 has passed. We have all had a very strange summer but we pushed though and got lots of good things done. With the huge influx of new Arrowhead owners there have been lots of questions about trees, followed up by owners and contractors moving dead and diseased trees to the Forest Refuse Site. The pile is estimated to

be about 120,000 cubic feet. Almost 50% more than last year!

A burn permit for the site will be obtained from the State of Colorado Air Pollution Control Division. In order to meet the permit requirements, the pile will be burned after there is at least a foot of snow on the ground and when weather conditions will allow the venting of the smoke to higher elevations and away from populated areas. The Arrowhead community will be informed about 24 hours in advance of the burn. Because of the confined space at the burn site, please observe the burn from a distance.

The overall damage from spruce bud worm is less than last year but there are several "hot spots" where the damage is very heavy. The



infestation should continue to decline over the next few years, but the primary concern now is that the trees in the "hot spots" have been weakened to the point that they are more likely to be killed by bark beetles. Owners that had a heavy attack in 2020 should use liquid Sevin, ACE Caps and MCH packs in early June to protect their trees.

Ordering information and use of these products is a little confusing, especially for new owners, so I will outline the process.

- Liquid Sevin is available at home improvement and hardware stores in a gallon bottle that attaches to a garden hose.

 Because the application height is dependent on water pressure, this product works best on smaller trees. Spraying should occur when the Spruce Bud Worm first appears on the trees, about the second week of June.
- ACE caps can be ordered from Bill Conway starting about Nov 1. Although they are available from other sources, they are made available here at the manufactures wholesale price. Unless you have a "hot spot" on your property I only recommend putting up ACE Caps to reduce the nuisance of having worms and their webbing hanging around your residence and vehicles. The 3/8" size should be used on trees under 20 inches in diameter and be placed in drilled holes every 6 inches around the tree below the lowest green branches. The ½" size is used on trees over 20 inches in diameter and are placed every 8 inches around the tree.
- MCH packs have been a huge success in reducing Douglas fir and spruce beetle killed trees at Arrowhead. As a community we put up 15500 in 2020. MCH pack ordering will also start Nov 1. Information is available in the forestry section of the AIA website on how many to order or you can contact Bill Conway for advice. The best time to put up MCH packs is about June 15. There will be a message on Facebook when the beetles start to fly, which is the prime time to put up the packs. If you will not be available to put up the MCH packs at the best time you can have them put up by a volunteer from the fire department with a donation of your choice to the **Arrowhead Volunteer Fire Dept (AVFD).**

Prices for the ACE and MCH packs will be available on our website on or around October 15th. Once ordering your packs, please make your check out to the Arrowhead Improvements Association. Checks for MCH installation (only) are made out to the Arrowhead Fire Protection District. ALL checks are to mailed to **Bill Conway**, **1734 SE 52nd Ave.**, **Portland**, **OR 97215**.

Logging of the spruce beetle kill has resumed on the Alpine Plateau. About 5000 acres of trees were killed by the spruce beetles over the last several years. 1500 acres were logged last winter and about another 1500 acres will be logged from now until the road closures begin on Hwy 50 in March. To stay up to date about logging and road conditions it is recommended to bookmark and check our <u>Road Activity Message Board</u> located on our <u>AIA website</u>

Logging on the Alpine:

Several years ago, the AIA made an agreement with the US Forest Service that when logging was occurring on the Alpine Plateau there would be no log haul on the Alpine Plateau Road on Thanksgiving weekend and between Christmas and New Year's Day. The reason for that agreement was to avoid conflicts between logging trucks and snowmobiles during those high use snowmobile times.



Although the current logging is being done on US Forest Service land the timber sales are being administered under a Colorado State Forest Service contract. When that contract was written log haul was also excluded on all Federal Holidays. However, the timber sale purchaser, Montrose Forest Products, requested a waiver of that restriction for the holidays of:



- Columbus Day Oct 12, 2020
- Veteran's Day Nov 11, 2020
- Martin Luther King Day Jan 18, 2021
- President's Day Feb 15, 2021

This request was granted last winter without incident and the AIA has agreed to waive the restriction on these four Federal Holidays again this winter.

These extra haul days will allow for the removal of more of the beetle killed trees from the Alpine Plateau before haul is suspended in the spring of 2021 because of the Little Blue Canyon Highway 50 project.

The primary concern for Arrowhead residents with this operation is safety on the Alpine Road. Owners should expect similar activity to last year with 20 to 30 loaded trucks per day and occasional long low boy trucks moving heavy equipment. The timber purchaser has agreed to use pilot cars with the low boys on the lower portion of the Alpine. Owners and log trucks have an equal responsibility to drive safely on the Alpine. If you observe any problems with the trucks please report as many of the following items as possible to Bill Conway (541-729-6259), so that he can follow up with the State Forest Service and Montrose Forest Products: Date, time, location, and details of the incident; truck color, name on door, and most definitive identification of all is the black numbers painted on the end of the logs. Montrose Forest Products takes safety very seriously and some serious or repeated problems last year resulted in removal of that truck from the sale.

Bill will be leaving Arrowhead for the winter in mid-October, BUT can be reached by phone or email to take care of any questions regarding hazard trees, insect and disease or logging problems.

Design Review Message

Wow! The leaves are turning their beautiful fall colors and our building season is rapidly coming to an end. Our last official meeting for the year is **October 12th at 4pm**. We still have many projects that are ongoing, just beginning, and being finalized. If you are wanting to start a project next summer, you don't need to wait until we meet in the spring. The Design Review Committee has become very proficient in getting this done via email. If you can approve your plans and get a deposit on a contractor, now, it makes things move along much quicker when the snow melts. After the snow melts, we can do our site visit and have your permit finalized.



With that being said, a couple of reminders:

- When you are planning a property improvement, you need to have the <u>Construction Agreement</u> and <u>Plot Plan</u> sent to me(<u>jthompsonaia.drc@gmail.com</u>) and the \$100 permit fee needs to be sent to the highlighted address on the <u>Construction Agreement</u>. This address is AIA Office, PO Box 83 Gunnison Colorado, 81230.
- You need to locate your center pin and flag several points on the property boundary.
- Flag several points to the adjacent properties as well.
- Flag any site of improvements -- driveway, shed perimeter, trees you think need removed, etc.
- Once this is done, a DRC committee member will come and do a site visit.
- Please refer to this document for many of the different project types done in Arrowhead.
- For specific Design Review guide, here is the links to the <u>DRC webpage</u> and our AIA <u>Regulations</u>.
- DRC members are happy to assist you in this process but as the property owner you are responsible for the accuracy of the center pin. A professional site survey is the best way to be positive of an accurate center pin, if it is in question.

This summer over 50 properties have changed hands in Arrowhead. We are so excited to see all the new Community Members. Please know that **all** property improvements need to go through the DRC. Most require a permit. Some just get the go ahead "OK" because they are considered maintenance. It is better to ask than be in violation of the Arrowhead Regulations. We have a lot of new contractors up here and they do not know our <u>Regulations</u>. It is the homeowner who is responsible for educating themselves and their contractors about the rules.

** Utilities** - Many owners have been asking about putting in utilities. Please note that this MUST be approved by the Design Review Committee. You are not required to pay for a permit, but we must approve the location of your plans. Failure to notify the Design Review Committee could result in up to \$1000 in fines.

Shed Regulations

- All Sheds MUST be approved by the Arrowhead Design Review Committee.
- If you have an approved Gunnison Co septic system, you do not need a Gunnison Co building permit as long as your shed is no larger than 200sf. If the shed is larger than 200sf you are required to apply for a building permit through Gunnison Co.
- If you do not have an approved Gunnison Co septic system, you are required to get a building permit from Gunnison Co no matter what the size.

Please continue to follow the requirements set forth for improvements in the <u>2020 AIA Regulations</u>. This helps the committee move forward for you more quickly. Please also continue to be knowledgeable of the updates from Gunnison Co on <u>Covid-19</u> <u>Gunnison Co Health Regulation</u>.

We look forward to continuing serving the owners' of this great community.

THE 2019 JOHN KRALL AWARD

August 15, 2020



This volunteer has been a member of our community since 2003.

His attention to detail and his relentless concern for the safety of our community are well beyond any requirements for this award. This Year's John Krall Award winner is Jim Gelsomini.

He has been our Fire Chief for 5 / years. At his request, he continues to be unpaid for his services as Fire Chief. Jim works for the fire department a tremendous amount of hours over many days each and every week.

He attended fire fighter training, an eight-week course, put on by Gunnison Fire. He commuted to Gunnison 2 nights per week plus some Saturdays. When training ended late this included hotel stays. All of this he did at his personal expense.

Jim has attended many medical training First Responder classes at Arrowhead, Gunnison and Lake City.

Every Sunday, you can find Jim at the firehouse starting up every engine including vehicles, pumps, chainsaws, etc. to ensure operational status.



His trips to Montrose always include shopping for the fire department for items needed for repair projects, equipment improvements and medical supplies. He spends extra time shopping at various stores in order to get the best possible prices to save the AVFD funds.

An outside wall in the equipment bay had water damage from snow melting off equipment and leaking through the wall during the winter. Jim tore the wall open, repaired the damage and put it back together saving several thousand dollars for the department. He also came up with a solution to prevent the issue in the future.

In another cost savings move, saving the cost of an electrician, he rewired the heating circuits in the equipment bay to run off a timer in order to take advantage of "time of use" savings in electrical service. This sounds simple but this was a big effort costing the department very little.

During power outages the firehouse communication radios, lights and bay door openers used to become non-functional. Jim rewired circuits so now these functions can run from a generator. During every power outage, Jim makes the trip into the firehouse to activate this service in order to keep emergency response ready.

Jim was a major labor contributor on the project to replace the extremely old pump on the large trailer/sled. He added enhancement to the new pump's plumbing when it was installed.

Fire codes require the fire fighter's gear worn to structure fires be no older than 10 years because the fire retardant capabilities deteriorate over time. Many of the AVFD's fire fighter suits were older, some as old as 30 years! Due to all the monetary saving from the work Jim volunteers instead of hiring the work out, the AVFD was able to purchase new gear over the past few years.

Another area that has benefited from savings due to Jim's volunteer efforts is having funds to replace the Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) equipment that was no longer certifiable. Interesting side note here; Jim does routine practice with SCBAs by sometimes wearing one while working on equipment on Sundays. The SCBAs are like a heavy, bulky backpack so it takes strength, balance and coordination to deal with them.

Jim attends emergency management meetings with other departments in Gunnison County over many months throughout the Year. Since COVID, Jim has been part of county meetings in order to maintain safety for our First Responders.

Recently, Jim hasn't allowed any cleaning staff to come into the firehouse in order to minimize COVID danger and to protect our First Responders. Instead, Jim has been doing the cleaning.

The Arrowhead Fire Protection District's long range plan included the purchase of a Type 3 fire truck. Due to Jim's relationships with Gunnison County, they donated the red truck you see at the Arrowhead firehouse, saving our fire district over \$100,000.

These examples are just a short list of the voluntary efforts that Jim performs. The amount of his volunteer work is huge. But he does it all quietly so most people don't realize his contribution.

One of the requirements for the John Krall Award is the awardees contribute without any expectation of reward or recognition. This fits Jim perfectly. He doesn't broadcast his accomplishments. You find out about them when you see the finished product and the results.



These tasks were all performed by the single officer on duty. While we wear a badge and uniform and we'll respond to all emergencies 24/7, we are "on duty" only 40 hrs. a week. (We work 7 days Sunday to Sunday.) Owners and guests should keep in mind that our work day is <u>not</u> 24 hours long. If a request for services, such as inspecting a fire-pit, are made after late afternoon, that request will infringe on the Officer's personal time.

As per regulations, no private vehicle may be left in the parking lot until Saturday, October 10th.



- <u>All</u> vehicles must be registered with Patrol and have a yellow Arrowhead sticker or a visitor pass. Included are cars, trucks, snowmobiles, trailers, and OHVs.
- There is a designated area and \$50 fee for trailers. Contact Patrol for specifics.
- Snowmobiles and OHVs (Geezer-mobiles) may be left in the main parking area for 2 nights <u>only</u>. Otherwise, they are to be parked on the hillside, keeping in mind that the groomer must have room to plow <u>behind</u> the box trailers.
- There is limited parking and a \$265 fee for the diesel parking area and must be reserved through Patrol.

Running driveways:

Patrol will again, offer the service of running driveways to cabins. This is to facilitate access and to put eyes on the structures to see if damage has occurred in the absence of the owner.

The following requirements are:

- A signed **Liability Waiver** must be on file with Patrol.
- A <u>safe</u> access and egress must be marked to and from the filing road and the cabin with pairs of poles at least 4 feet above ground level.
- The route must be approved by Patrol <u>before</u> the season starts.
- Contact Patrol for more specifics.

We hope that this will be a peaceful and snowballed winter.


