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Dear Arrowhead Owners,

The beginning of March brought some much needed snows to Arrowhead! However, as of this writing, total snowfall remains below average for this time of year. I am hopeful we will receive more storms during the remainder of March and April. Historically, springtime in the high country has brought some good snows.

Considering that there will not be another Smoke Signals until the June-July issue, a springtime hot topic is always, "when will the roads be open?" Please remember that there is no set date for our heavy equipment operators to open the filing roads. Pushing the snow is dictated by snow conditions, temperatures and melt. All of these factors are closely monitored by our lead heavy equipment operator. Road openings, status and conditions, will be announced by email blast, posted on the AIA web site, and posted on the AIA Facebook page.

Arrowhead, being the four season community that is, can boast of several winter time activities and events. The snowshoe golf tournament was a great success, a full moon snowmobile ride was fun for all, and the Arrowhead Snowmobile Club sponsored Poker Run for residents and non-residents was also an exciting event. Also, game days at the Lodge and the weekly firehouse potluck dinners have been well attended.

Recently, I have received complaints and concerns from owners regarding snowmobilers running off the Alpine, the groomed filing roads, and approved trails on to both common ground and private property. Winter time residents and owners enjoy the serenity and beauty of Arrowhead and the unmarked snow. In making cut across trails, ghost trails and going off roads/trails it is not only an aesthetic issue, it is a safety and trespass concern. In response to this concern, I recently asked Arrowhead Patrol to step up their efforts to remind owners and guests to curtail the practice of running off road along the Alpine and in the subdivision proper. Please stay on approved roads and trails.

The next AIA board meeting will be on May 16. The special board work session meeting will be on May

15. Times, location, and agendas will be posted well in advance of the meetings on the AIA web site for your consideration. I, and the entire board, encourage you to attend. Even though there will not be another meeting until May, the board continues to be active in managing and facilitating the many day to day operations of your association.

Arrowhead is managed as a four season residential community, with the goal of enabling all residents, visitors, and emergency responders to have the ability to move about the community safely 365 days of the year. This is not only a convenience, but a necessity, as the insurance and banking communities require it of us.

While some of us may be off the mountain, or on the mountain sitting in front of our wood stoves reading a good book, our heavy equipment operators, patrol, fire, medical, and utility company personnel are out in the weather, day or night, as needed, keeping our community operating. They've even been known to miss their 'better half's' birthday party in favor of getting out there to 'get the job done'.

If you pay close attention, you will notice that most of the snow management work is done in the hours of darkness, while the rest of the community sleeps, so that, at sunrise, the community can go about its scheduled day as planned.

As you snowmobile past the AED boxes scattered throughout the community, notice the footprints in the snow where Patrol has checked to ensure the heaters are working to keep the AEDs warm. While Arrowhead is a magical place, it takes a lot of dedicated folks to make it so magical.

Please be especially respectful toward these folks during our upcoming transition from winter to spring. They have a practiced plan on how best to 'open up' the community to wheeled vehicles, and can most effectively execute that plan if they are not pulled off plan to do 'special projects'. 



<u>Winter Vehicle Training Drives</u> The Snow Cat with 500 gallon trailer in tow and medical snow mobiles continue monthly winter training by driving through the Arrowhead Community, confirming operational capabilities. 500 Gallon trailer skis have proven operational through the varying snow depths on the filing roads.

<u>First Responder Training</u> Arrowheads First Responder team will conduct a training session Tuesday March 17th, at the Fire House starting at 10AM, demonstrating the new Med Sled device used for transporting patients up and down interior and exterior stairs and narrow passage ways. In addition to the hands on Med Sled training, the team will provide a practical training session for a variety of air splints used for all seasons.

- Furnace Filters
- Propane tanks level

- Clock batteries
- Computer batteries
- Fire Extinguisher gauge ensure they in good operation
- AED if you have an AED at home, check the battery and pad expiration dates

Snow Report provided by Linda Dysart—Thank you!



Winter snows just got a good start at Arrowhead in March, but spring isn't far off in May. Both Mother Nature and Arrowhead residents will be busy in the Arrowhead forest by early June. As the Douglas fir and spruce trees start to come out of dormancy some of them will find that beetles have eaten their cambium layers and the trees will not be able to get water to their tops.


Douglas fir trees that have this problem will turn red in a few days. At that point we only have about 10 days to remove the trees from Arrowhead before the beetles fly on to adjacent trees. Spruce beetles usual stay in the trees for two years and the effect on the trees is a little slower. The trees will gradually start losing needles and turn yellow. There will be a lot of bark flakes at the base of the tree from woodpecker activity. In either case, the trees need to be removed before the beetles attack adjacent trees. I need ALL Arrowhead owners to help with this process. If you see dying trees on either private lots or community property let me know immediately.

Douglas fir and spruce trees that have blown down over the winter will attract lots of beetles. Let me know about those and we can talk about how and when they should be removed. The details are very important. A couple years ago an Arrowhead resident cut up a dead Douglas fir that was infested with beetles into 6' lengths and piled them between other trees. The following year there were 12 additional trees killed by beetles around that pile. We now have a significant beetle hot spot that is going to take several years to control. This is just one example of how the wrong action can create an even bigger beetle problem. Please contact me so we can work out the best possible solution.

By far the best way to deal with Douglas fir beetle is to use the MCH packs to prevent infection. The order has been completed for 2015, but I will have some MCH packets available for sale if you forgot to order. A total of 12,200 will be put up at Arrowhead in 2015. The MCH packets will be available for pickup at the board meeting in May. There will also be messages on the Arrowhead home page, facebook, and blast emails about how to take delivery in other ways and when to put up the packs. People that have ordered and provided their email to me will receive direct email updates on this information. If you ordered and didn't provide an

email address, I encourage you to do so, my email is below. You can also register for Arrowhead Improvement Association blast emails by sending your request to arrowheadblast@gmail.com. If you cannot be at Arrowhead at the proper time to put the packs up, I can arrange to have them put up by a volunteer. I suggest a voluntary donation of your choice to the Arrowhead Volunteer Fire Department. Your donation is usually used to buy medical equipment for use by first responders.

As I write this article, Arrowhead is behind on snow this winter. If we are fortunate, there will be good summer rains to prevent the development of high fire danger this summer. (continued on next page)



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The drought conditions in other parts of the west will probably put a strain on national firefighting resources; even a moderate fire season in our part of Colorado could present challenges for getting enough people and equipment to fight wildfires. Time will tell, but what we can all do is work on things that are within our control.

Winter weather always creates a blowdown of trees and branches that need to be cleaned up to reduce the risk of fire in the community. That leads to other work that needs to be done to mitigate the effects of wildfire. Removal of dead and down forest debris and small trees and branches that can carry a ground fire into the crowns of trees is called mitigation. Creating space between the crowns of the remaining trees will reduce the risk of fire spreading from tree to tree. Each owner should feel the responsibility of accomplishing this work not only to protect their property from fire but also their neighbors and the community as whole. If you own a house at Arrowhead you can expect to have this discussion with your insurance company in the near future. Each lot has different needs so please call and I will be happy to help you make a plan for your lot.

A big part of the winter clean up and removal of beetle killed trees is done by a great group of volunteers in the summer. You can join this group of your neighbors for Clean Up Day – see the article and listing of Dates in this issue. It is always amazing how much work 30 to 40 people can get done in 3 hours. 50 to 60 people or more could get even more done.

If you have any questions about your trees give me a call and I will be happy to take a look. Remember that you need a permit to cut any live trees over 2" in diameter.

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
