Spring has finally come to Arrowhead! The last vestiges of snow are receding, the aspens are leafing out and the moods of our residents have brightened considerably. Slowly but surely our snowbirds are drifting back and we look forward to each new arrival with great anticipation.

The Board is busily reviewing a list of suggested priorities which Vice-President, Bruce Saunders, was kind enough to put together for us. The goal of this exercise is to assemble a cohesive plan for the future of Arrowhead to present to the property owners for consideration. Several projects require a great deal of funding and the Board wants to ensure that our property owners have their input included in the process. This is a complicated business so we want to take our time with it. The Board will present our ideas at a regularly scheduled meeting as soon as it is feasible.

Our newly purchased dozer blade performed wonderfully during the work to open the roads. It arrived just in the nick of time to be useful during this exercise. We look forward to having it for the whole season next year.

We were fortunate that the Alpine did not flood as was originally feared. The Little Blue Creek did rise quite a bit and caused some erosion. Thanks to Leonard Wasilewski and Jim Gelsomini of Security for their vigilance in keeping track of conditions and setting up traffic cones marking the effected areas. Thanks, also, to Pete Nauyokas for using his time and equipment to move boulders into the most eroded areas to stabilize them. We will be contacting Gunnison County to work with them on improving the Alpine. In the mean time, especially if you're bringing up a RV, you might want to exercise some extra caution. There are some narrow places that might be more difficult than usual to negotiate.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the Fourth of July Picnic which will actually take place on the fifth of July this year. We're adding some new features so if you enjoyed the picnic in the past you'll enjoy it even more this year.

To my knowledge there have been two bear sightings to date. So it's time to bring in the bird feeders and muster out the whistles and air horns. Let's have a safe and enjoyable spring and summer.

FIRE CHIEF'S LETTER

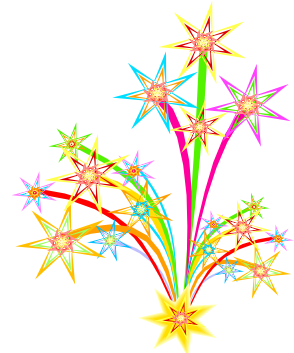

The fire department has switched over from winter equipment to our summer equipment. We had a great winter up here but it was kind of nice to see the wheels back on our red brush truck and the snow-mobiles stored in the maintenance shed.



Summer is going to be a busy one as usual for the fire department. The fire fighters will meet regularly for training as well as gear up for our summer fire house games. Our winter games made us all more familiar with our winter equipment and we expect the summer games to give us more insight to our summer vehicles and equipment. Set your calendars for Saturday, September 1st. We will have a pancake breakfast prior to the games. It is a good time to meet your neighbors, eat some pancakes and cheer on your firemen.

The department is also gearing up for the annual 4th of July picnic. We always have the picnic on a Saturday to accommodate our out of town folks. This year the picnic will be held on July 5. This is our biggest fund raiser and event of the year. Come to the flea market and specialty booths, enter our raffle, bid at the silent auction, watch and participate in various games, eat some great food and visit with your friends. All the proceeds go to help the fire department with equipment and maintenance. Of course we always appreciate your donations to the flea market, raffle and silent auction. Since we are now a fire protection district your donations will be tax deductible.



Since summer is a time we have a large group of seasonal residents it is also a good time to review our emergency protocol. If you have an emergency please call our emergency number at 862-9911. This will direct you to a party line of 20 fire department personnel. As this is a party line you will hear all sorts of noise, especially answering machines. Please be patient. Someone will ask you what your emergency is and get your information. If your emergency is of a medical nature and you require an ambulance we will ask you to call 911 as well. If you are unable to call 911, we will gladly do it for you. Now is a good time to remind you to replace your batteries in your smoke detectors. We also recommend that you review your fire escape plans in case you can't go out your front or back doors in a fire emergency. An escape ladder, rope or other type, is highly suggested if you have a second floor.

Our community has always had a great spirit in helping others in need. This generosity is shown particularly around Christmas time. Lets remember our less fortunate ones during this picnic as well. If you can bring a can or two of food to the picnic the fire department would then donate it to the Gunnison food bank to provide for those going through a difficult time."

I know most of you are aware that we had a winter for the record books that pushed our human and capital resources to new limits. We owe a huge thank you to our regular and volunteer folks who put in a lot of time in some really nasty conditions to keep our roads open and our residents safe. Hoping I don't miss anyone let's thank (in no particular order) Will Hobson, Gary Kelly, Pete Nauyokas, Eric Johnson, Oscar Ratliff, Glen Isbell, Leonard Wasilewski and Jim Gelsomini for all of their efforts and hard work. Thanks also to all of those folks that regularly showed up to help clear the parking lot on several occasion.

Our new blade for the loader arrived in time to help us with opening the filing roads. It is going to be especially helpful next year on the Alpine. One of our first orders of spring-cleaning is going to be bringing the grader up to snuff for next year. It is the consensus of your road committee that with the addition of the new blade and some investment in our existing grader that we can push out the immediate need for a newer model grader. This acquisition really needs further study and will probably need to go to a vote of the property owners.

He has made great progress in improving these relationships and moving them towards some very specific improvements you will be hearing about.

The late spring has delayed moving forward on the parking lot restroom and trailer dump station. Now that we can see the ground once again Richard Ostrom is working with the appropriate folks to get this underway and set up for a target 08 completion. Rich is another volunteer who has really put in a lot of effort and deserves special recognition.

In closing please remember that SPEED hurts our roads more than any other single factor. If you want good roads OBEY the speed limits and give the "STINK EYE" to those that don't.

SECURITY REPORT

First of all a huge thank you to all the security officers who braved the elements throughout this brutal winter. This year the conditions presented a huge challenge to all our officers and they really went above and beyond the call of duty to serve our community.

One specific problem the officers encountered was a lack of information to contact homeowners if there were damage to property. During their rounds they would find a problem with a home and have no information with which to inform the property owner. If you are off the mountain for a significant amount of time each year, please, advise the Arrowhead Improvements Association office of how best to contact you. This is strictly for the protection of your property so, if there is any damage, you can be contacted in a timely manner and take steps to remedy the situation. Please, take the time to do this so that security can better serve the community.

HEALTH ON THE MOUNTAIN by Joyce Boulter

Ticks are more active from April to June. (they may last into July this year) Use repellants containing DEET carefully, especially on children. Colorado Tick Fever is carried by the wood tick. CTF is a viral illness causing fever, headaches, body aches, nausea, abdominal pain and lethargy. The symptoms last 4-5 days, complete recovery often takes 2-3 weeks and results in future immunity. Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever And Lyme disease are rare to non-existent in Colorado.

Remove the tick by grasping it as near to the skin as possible and pulling slowly straight out. Small tweezers or gloved hands will work. Do not use matches, Vaseline or other folk techniques to remove the tick.

You also need to be aware of mosquito borne viruses and protect yourself. The mosquitoes usually feed more actively at dawn and dusk. Wear long sleeves and long pants when out at these times. Insect repellants with DEET are effective. Always follow label directions. Make sure screens are in good repair and remove all sources of standing water. West Nile Virus infection usually occurs from May to September. The incubation time is 5-15 days. Symptoms include fever, headache and malaise and last 2-7 days. If fever develops after mosquito bite, check with your physician.

This last year, the medical rescue team has been working to upgrade our skills. Twelve members of the firehouse participated in a First Responder course. One thing we noted that was very important to getting information at a home medical call was the emergency information sheet that is supposed to be attached to the refrigerator with a magnet. **Included is a copy of this sheet for your use on the following page.**

Jimmy & Paul, the staff at the Cimarron Post Office, would like to thank you for your support throughout the year and pass on a few reminders regarding our operations.

1) Our counter hours are 8:00 am-12:00 pm and 12:30 pm-4:30 pm, Monday through Friday. Saturday hours are 10:00 am to 12:00 pm. Closed on Federal holidays.

2) Mail delivery to Alpine boxes is made by a contractor late mornings, Monday, Wednesday and Friday. If a holiday falls on a Monday, mail is delivered on Tuesday.

3) If you do not maintain a post box at the post office or on the Alpine, all mail received at the post office **WILL BE IMMEDIATELY RETURNED TO THE SENDER.** Boxes are available for rent at a minimal fee in the post office lobby. If you are a part time resident, mail can be addressed "in care of General Delivery" but will be held for only 30 days, then sent back to sender.
