The Security team has installed new traffic signs, a STOP sign on UTE when entering onto RIM Rd and a warning sign to slow down when making a left turn from RIM Rd onto UTE. This intersection is prone to accidents because of excessive speed, so please adhere to these traffic signs for yours and other's safety. We appreciate the public's help and observations and please do call directly to Security's cell phone, **970-209-6335** and speak with the Security Officer on duty or leave a message reference any issues that concern you.

Fall is here and so are some important dates to mark on your calendar!

- 1. The winter parking lot will open **October 15** according to our "County Land Use Permit" and you may preposition your vehicles, snowmobiles and trailers.
- 2. All camping equipment, tents, motor homes, camp trailers, truck campers, self contained RV's, must be removed from the site and boundaries of Arrowhead, prior to **November 18th**. The AIA Board is required to set a date per our AIA Covenants, but please use common sense if heavy snow arrives early this year, please remove your RVs as soon as possible from your property.
- 3. Assigned diesel parking spaces are available for \$200 for the entire winter season. Short term diesel parking spaces are also available for the cost of \$50 for a full week and \$10 per weekend (Fri-Sun). Trailer spaces (for the entire winter) cost \$50. Short term trailer spaces with trucks are available in a designated marked row of the parking lot, with no charge. We encourage you to make your reservation as early as possible, to ensure your space.

At the October 20th AIA Board meeting and Winter Resident's meeting I will discuss the Winter Parking lot rules in more detail.

THE STREET SHE SEE SEEDS IN LITE

It is starting to cool off, from the 60's and 70's to the 50's. That is for all the owners that spent the summer in the hot climates. There have been numerous driveway locations, R/V pads, sheds and a garage. Please try to have your center pin flagged on your property. Mark it with colored tape and put some markers in the trees around it also. I have tried to initiate using red or pink tape for center pins and green tape for property edges. I will give some to owners if you need it. It took three tries and two days to find one center pin. We are going to try out GPS locations from the county, but they are not always accurate in the trees. We find walking over the lot is usually the best way and have often stumbled over a pin. Between now and snowfall the committee will be checking on the numerous mitigation and defensible space projects. Owners with projects due this fall will be given another year for completion. Before you begin a mitigation or defensible space project you must have a plan written by a certified representative of the AIA board. MOUNTAIN HEALTH

This will be my tenth winter on the mountain. I have been retired from school nursing for 10 years and when I hear people talking about immunizations I still perk up my ears. Last week, while at the doctors office, I got my flu shot. I thought I would look into adult immunizations. Here is the list that adults over 60 need. This information can be viewed at www.cdc.gov.



Influenza Td booster One dose annually, usually in September or October

Booster every ten years. With a cut or incident your physician may give

a booster at that time.

Zoster

One dose after 60. This is the immunization to reduce the occurrence

of shingles and reduce the pain or neuralgia. Shingles is the adult reaction to virus in the body from childhood chickenpox. You should have the vaccine even if you don't remember having chickenpox. You may have been exposed or have a mild reaction as a child and still have the remaining virus. The vaccine is also recommended for adults that have had one episode of shingles, to reduce the chances of another

episode.

Pneumococcal

May have one or two doses before 65, but need one dose after 65. This is effective for pneumococcus pneumonia. There are other types of pneumonia that are not covered by this vaccine. The vaccine is good at reducing the severe life threatening disease, but may not prevent infection in everyone.

Flu, Td, Zoster, and Pneumococcal may be given at the local health department and at some pharmacies, like Walgreens and City Markets as well as your private physician's office. You should call ahead to make sure it is available and see if you need an appointment. joyce.boulter@gmail.com

Cranberry Streusel Pie

1/2 (15 oz) package refrigerated piecrusts

1/2 c. fresh or frozen cranberries

1/4 c. sugar

1/4 c. firmly packed light brown sugar

1/2 c. chopped walnuts

1/2 tsp.ground cinnamon

1 large egg

1/4 c. butter or marg. melted

1/2 c. sugar

3 tbs. all purpose flour


Fit piecrust into a 9in. pie plate according to package directions; Fold edges under and crimp. Stir together cranberries and next 4 ingredients and spoon into piecrust.

Whisk together egg and next three ingredients; pour over cranberry mixture.

Bake at 400° for 20 min. Reduce

temperature to 350° and bake for 30 more minutes.

Yield: 1 (9 inch) pie

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MEET THE CREWS-WHITBYS

"Two thousand miles is a long way to drive," admits summer residents, Karen Crews and her twin sister Carolyn Crews-Whitby, "but escaping the heat and humidity of Florida for the balmy weather of Colorado makes it all worthwhile.




The Galloping Goose

The RGS built its first motor in 1913, as a track maintenance crew vehicle. This was wrecked in 1925, but inspired the idea of using motors for scheduled service.

All of the "geese" were built in the railroad's shops at Ridgway, Colorado. The first was built in 1931 from the body of a Buick "Master Six" four-door sedan. It was more conventional in its construction than the later geese, though it had a two-axle truck in place of the front axle.

Part of the rear of the car was replaced by a truck stake-bed for carrying freight and mail; this was later enclosed and partially fitted with seating. It was used for two years to carry passengers, US Mail, and light freight before being scrapped.

Goose #5 was bought by the city of <u>Dolores, Colorado</u>. After restoration in 1998 it is now operated from time to time on the Cumbres and Toltec and Durango and Silverton tourist railroads, as well as at the Colorado Railroad Museum. (from Wikipedia)




